
A couple of slots are being left open to enable flexibility around the re-organisation.

These Boots were made for walking—the return of the White/Cumberland Experience

On Sunday 13th March, just before 10 a.m., a dozen members of the Society and friends were seen gathering in the Jockey Lane Car Park, Cranbrook, to take part in a Sponsored Walk to help raise funds for the MS Society, our chosen charity for 'Cowardy Custard'. Those present were:

To ensure that we did not lose pace, we were joined by four rather lovely dogs, namely Dexter and Roxy c/o the Roberts, Oscar c/o Lydia and Henry Weiner c/o the Davis'.



Shortly after 10 a.m. we were off, with maps, compasses and GPS technology in hand, and were soon emerging from the outskirts of Cranbrook and heading down the High Weald Landscape Trail towards Benenden. The promised rain was staying away and whereas there was little sun. the cloud was fairly light, giving us plentiful opportunities to enjoy the local countryside. After a few fields, tight stiles, slippery mud slopes and wooded areas, one dog leash was uncoupled and we were treated to a display of amazing athletic sprints by Roxy. who ran faster than a speeding

Not that such a service was needed, our team was in fine spirit and after a few drinks and nibbles, we were donning our gear and ready to restart the walk.



Back into Benenden village we walked, before heading south, then west to Netter's Hall Farm and then north all the way. The Swattenden Centre came into sight, as did the Windmill and we were nearly home. At this point, the soft drizzle started and we lost Andy, Ruth and Keir! Fortunately, with the aid of mobile phones, we were able to find them (or did they find us?) and

we staggered back into the Car Park just after 3:30pm, having completed a walk of 9.5 miles. There were a couple of memorable highlights: Andy and Lisa slipped over in the mud and Brenda lost both shoes in seperate muddy patches. Fortunately no injuries were sustained and everyone had a great time.



After the boots came off, we estimated that we had raised sponsorship in the region of £850. However, as a result of further voluntary donations, including £100 from Andy's employers, Novae Syndicates at Lloyds, we will have raised in excess of £1,000. We hope to announce the precise amount raised in the next edition of Codswallop.


