Anniversary Dinner would have been down in time for me
to complete my catalogue of triumphs and stalwarts. I
wanted to make sure I did finish it off here because it is
important to acknowledge the work of today's heroes as
well as those of the past - so here goes.

The "cornerstones" that I referred to are
not only individuals and families but also
the many organisations without which the
life of the Society would be very much the
poorer. One thinks of the goodwill we
have received and still enjoy from Peter
Jones, Phillips Man's Shop, Cranbrook
and Angley Schools, Raffles, DCPS, our
Patrons and Advertisers and our Auditors,
St Dunstan's and the Parish Council.

I now come to those members without
whose sterling work over many hours we
could not present the shows which so
many of us have enjoyed acting and
singing through over all these years. It is
that list of names that appear AFTER the
one of the cast's but which usually
exceeds it in numbers. Our last show
listed 40 cast but 49 in the Production
Team! My memories of great Producers
and Directors include Olive Lea, Wyatt-
Joyce, Dinah Chamberlin, Lesley
Whitwood, Sue Wightman, Pat Smith,
Angela Woodcock, Andy Chesters and of
course Annie of that name. Conductors
include Frank Eling - he died this year

aged 100 - Susan Hutton, Steve Pusey,
Bryan Gipps and Sue who did such a
great job with 'Kiss me Kate' travelling
from her home in Banbury!
Choreographers have trained legions of
dancers over the years - Louise Dixon,
Rachel Elliott, Steph Beeken and Vicki
King, our Stage Managers like Peter
Gray, Peggy Latter and Andrew White.
Ruth Roberts has been a most reliable
and sympathetic rehearsal pianist for so
many shows. Clearing up after a big
production makes one realise just how big
a job it is to handle the Wardrobe and Rita
and Marilyn excel in this most demanding
task. Ian Wookey and Mo are the latest in
a long line of Property people without
whose reliability there would be many
embarrassing moments for the performers
reaching for non-existing mandolins - yes
it did happen to me in 1959 .The
wonderful sets designed and built by the
Flishinghurst Gang (aka The Thursday
Gang) of Bill , Bernard, Dennis, Maurice,
Alan, John and Andy mean that the likes

In my 54 of those I recollect the very enjoyable play-readings which we used to hold during close-seasons! We don't seem to have any of those these days with all the months of rehearsal and preparation put in by so many members but they are worth considering.

At the party I really enjoyed Sarah's impromptu response to "The next ninety years" as, like her, I'm really enthusiastic for that time and with the present liking for live entertainment in what a certain person has called

"that all-singing all-dancing Cranbrook" (?) we should be able to look forward to many more super shows to come. Our next two are quite adventurous and I know that they will be anticipated with much eagerness by our audiences - especially if ALL of you can make a special effort to get the large audiences that they will deserve.

We should also not forget all the other members of the executive committee, who continue the work of all those stalwarts today and in the future.

Finally, let us remember the crucial role that dear old Gilbert and Sullivan played in our formative years and hope that it will not be too long before we have the audiences tapping feet and mouthing words which our wonderful casts can inspire. Is there a Mikado in the house? There was in 1920.

As we look back on a successful year (and for that matter 9 decades), we must not forget to look forward as well. As I said during the dinner, I am confident that the society is healthy, as we continue to attract new members who share our love for the theatre. We have many talented and enthusiastic people who are keen to get on stage and perform.

But as both George and Andrew have mentioned in their articles, society would not function without a number of individuals who play a less obvious role in the society. I would like to highlight some of these

roles that need our urgent attention.

Firstly, Michelle has served us heroically over the last few years as Honorary Secretary. She has decided she needs to relinquish this role at the AGM in March. So, to maintain the confidence we have in our society, we need to embrace the change and that relies on your commitment. Please think whether next year you can be a more active part of all our future.


